

Short description	EDIAKT II is a standard for electronic file exchange which was released in 2005. It describes the format for communication between two 'users' by electronic files, business cases and processes (including documents). While its predecessor EDIAKT was a standard for the exchange of electronic files among Austrian authorities at the federal level and business for services, EDIAKT II can be used at all governmental levels (local, regional and national). Additionally, EDIAKT II considers the customer perspective on the exchange of electronic files, including businesses and citizens. EDIAKT II is also a standard for long-term archiving of electronic files. Whereas EDIAKT required a specific hardware and software infrastructure to create and exchange files, EDIAKT II follows an open source approach.
