Governance

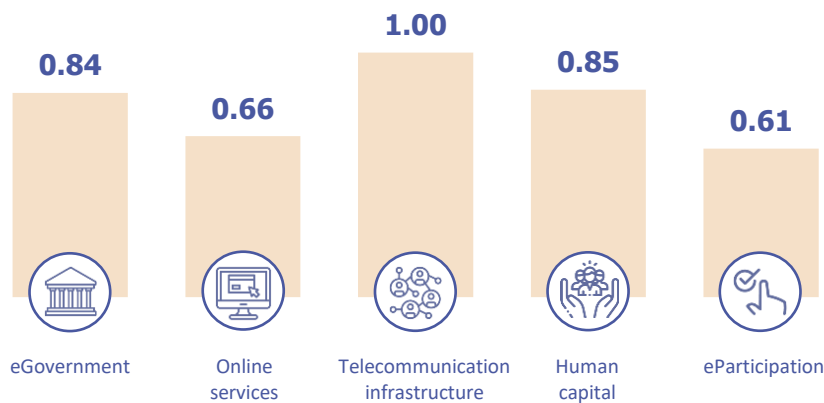
No update in the field of digital public administration governance has been reported to date.

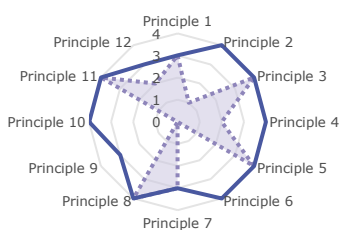
2020 eGovernment indicators*

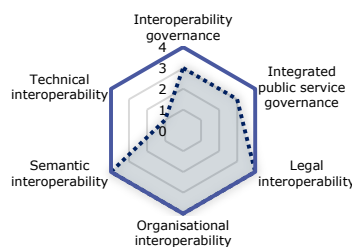

SCOREBOARD 1 TWELVE PRINCIPLES



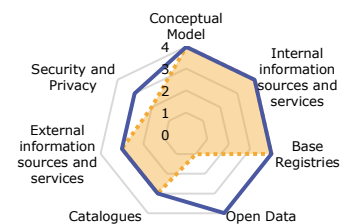
Legend: Liechtenstein (blue), EU Average (orange)
